Celebrating Community: Insights from Past UCS President Leonard Kam

We had the pleasure of hearing from Leonard Kam, whose longstanding dedication and leadership within the Chinese community have helped shape and strengthen UCS over the years. From his early involvement to serving in multiple leadership roles, his journey reflects a deep commitment to service, collaboration, and cultural preservation. We are grateful for the opportunity to learn from his experiences and perspectives as we continue building the future of our community.

Q1. You've been active in the Chinese community for many years. Can you share a little about your journey and what has motivated your volunteer work?

When I was in high school, we had a Chinese Club. Each club was responsible for fundraising on their own. My teacher/advisor at the time was on the committee that planned the Chinese New Year Celebration in the Chinatown Cultural Plaza. On her recommendation, the club had a booth at the event. We sold food and were very successful in our efforts. Upon graduation, I was asked to become the Chairperson for the event. Through my participation with the Chinese Chamber of Commerce I was able to make connections within the organization and in the Chinese community. Being young and active in the community made me a candidate for organizations recruiting me to join their respective clubs. This resulted in my joining 10 Chinese organizations and serving as President of 7 of them. I continue to be active in the majority of them today

Q2. When you revived the Parasol e-newsletter during your presidency, what was your vision for it, and what role do you think it plays in connecting the community today?

I've always believed that the Parasol is an invaluable means of communicating and connecting our fellow Chinese societies. Sharing between the societies provides an opportunity to share what has been working for their respective organization. It also serves as a way for organizations to collaborate with each other.

Q3. Looking back on your time as UCS president, what accomplishment or experience stands out most to you?

This was a time where we were just starting to get out of the COVID restrictions so we had limited opportunities to interact with our fellow Chinese societies. One of the most significant accomplishments was holding the drive-thru Chinese New Year food sale. This was a great way for the community to be able to get their Chinese New Year goodies in a safe manner. It also enabled UCS to work with some of our Chinatown businesses to help them during this very challenging time. We were also able to hold our first in-person banquet coming out of COVID. It was a great opportunity to honor our past presidents for their contributions over the years.

Q4. What advice would you give to newer generations of UCS members and leaders as they continue the work of sustaining our culture and community?

They really need to have a passion for sustaining the Chinese Societies. There are so many things and activities that challenge our time allocation. So many things are important, but you don't have to give up everything. It requires balance and prioritizing. I would encourage them to establish alliances with other younger leaders so that they don't have to bear the burden all by themselves. Networking and collaborating is the best way to achieve more. They also need to work with the senior members to learn about the history and legacy. Keeping these traditions alive will strengthen our community.

We mahalo Leonard Kam for sharing his experiences and thoughtful insights, and for his continued commitment to strengthening and connecting our community.
