
September 2022

Lum Sai Ho Tong

A Lam Family Reunion, July 2022

Kong Fuzi (Confucius) taught the importance of family, and these values have long been the foundation of Chinese society and culture. So when Ron and Pat Rollins of Minneapolis, Minnesota, published their book, “Our Lam Family History in Hawaii”, it sparked a need for the extended families to reunite. Pat Rollins is the granddaughter of Lam Toi who in 1868 came to Honolulu to start a new life. Lam Toi became a successful businessman in Chinatown and is known to have been one of the founders of both Lum Sai Ho Tong and See Yup Society.



Ron and Pat’s book details the history of the Chinese in Hawaii in the late 1800s and early 1900s. It includes research into the five generations of the Lam Toi family and all the efforts it took to document their genealogy. It also includes the recent trip to their ancestral village in China and information on the two benevolent societies that Lam Toi founded. A lot of excellent and thorough research went in to writing this book and is definitely a good read for those interested in early Chinese coming to Hawaii.

Palolo Chinese Home

Investing in the Next Generation of Caregivers

Palolo Chinese Home's commitment to providing Hawaii's seniors and their families with better care for better lives extends even to its internship programs, and so onto the next generation of caregivers. This summer, 15-year-old Christopher Han completed 25 hours of training and 200 hours of volunteer services in PCH's adult residential care home and gained invaluable experience in a real work environment. He learned how to care for seniors with cognitive challenges such as dementia, and those with physical disabilities such as difficulty walking. He became skilled at assisting during activities, meals, and in taking blood pressure and temperatures, as well as in helping with ambulation, exercise, and more. Christopher was dependable, caring, and showed a genuine passion for seniors.

This dedicated young volunteer was referred to PCH by his father, Geoffrey Han, Deputy Director of the Taiwan Economic & Cultural Office in Honolulu. Christopher came to Hawaii in 2019 with the hopes of perfecting his English, and with a wish to help other people as a prelude to a career as a physician. Upon arrival on Oahu, he attended Kawananako Intermediate and will be attending Roosevelt High School this Fall as a Junior. During his first two years at Kawananako, he made a lot of friends and became a member of a school Volunteer Club, where he welcomed freshmen and helped them to become acclimated to their new academic environment.

Christopher shared how volunteering at PCH was extremely rewarding. He enjoyed keeping the seniors' minds stimulated with the games played in the Activity unit, and felt that these interactions had a direct effect on improving their memories. During breaks, he would "talk story" with the kupuna, telling them things about his schooling and what he did in his free time. These were prime opportunities that strengthened his decision to become a physician, and the seniors benefitted from having such a wonderful, young individual to converse with. It was a "win-win" for all!

Special Pearl Harbor Boat Tour

It was also the day before Veterans Day, and 50 HCA members and their guests were treated to a special boat tour of the Pearl Harbor. 11/10/22 was a perfect day in Hawaii with sunshine and lots of breeze! The tour included a 45-minute documentary movie about the bombing of the Pearl Harbor, the Arizona Memorial and it also included a special tour of places not normally shown to the general public. On the trip, our guide brought us an advantageous view of Ford Island, the Ford Island Bridge, the wreckage of the USS Utah and the sites of other US warships that were attacked on 12/07/1941. The Ford Island was at the center of the attack on Pearl Harbor and the U.S. Pacific Fleet by the Imperial Japanese fleet. The Ford Island Bridge was constructed in 1998 which led to the development of Ford Island with over \$1-Billion worth of construction! Ford Island remains as an active military base today.
